GOALS 2011

Crittenton Women's Union (CWU) takes a unique, pioneering approach to helping low-income women achieve economic self-sufficiency. In one organization, we combine direct service programs—housing and family stabilization, work readiness training, and education—with independent research and public advocacy.

- In Fiscal Year 2011, CWU will
- Provide more than 1,300 people with housing, education, training, and family support services.
 - Expand its groundbreaking Career Family Opportunity program to Cambridge, offering 20 Cambridge Housing Authority clients the opportunity to become economically self-sufficient within five years.
 - Publish Beyond Financial Aid: 2010 Guide to Extra Help for Low-income Adult Students, a handbook to help low-income students learn about their eligibility for family supports.
 - Launch the Economic Mobility Institute, a comprehensive curriculum of trainings that allows low-income women to develop, in one setting, the skills, knowledge, and strategies necessary to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Quincy Asian Resources Inc. (QARI) is to foster and promote the development of the social, cultural, economic and civic lives of Asian Americans to benefit the entire community.

GOALS 2011

Through partnerships and collaborations, QARI will seek to deepen our impact on families and communities in Quincy and the South Shore. We strive to assist immigrants and their children to integrate through adult education and workforce development, youth leadership and education and family support in order to strengthen the larger community.

Since 2008 QARI has partnered with the Quincy Public Schools to offer mentoring, tutoring programs, new parent and student orientations at Quincy High School for recent immigrant students and the families. In 2011 we will expand our parent orientations to middle schools and deliver Chinese language parenting classes through Quincy Elementary schools.

Since 2005 QARI has taught adult immigrants English at times convenient for their work schedules. In 2011 we are taking the classes into the workplace with our Learn@Work program. Our business partners pay their employees to attend classes at their workplace and coordinate closely with the staff at QARI to support student progress.

CORPORATE GIVING OPPORTUNITIES AND GETTING INVOLVED

Corporations, groups and individual volunteers and donors make the work of QARI possible. The Quincy Lunar New Year Festival in February (attendance 7,000+), and the Quincy August Moon Festival (attendance 10,000+) raise funds to support the work of QARI in the community. More than 400 volunteers from partners such as State Street and high school students from Quincy create a festive atmosphere to share Asian culture with the broader community. The Quincy Asian Resources Community Banquet in May (attendance 600+) raises funds for youth programs and scholarships which recognize community service by high school students.
